#### **God's Mirror**

Lesson 1 – Outline

1. We are three-part beings: spirit, soul, and body.

"And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole *spirit* and *soul* and *body* be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Thess. 5:23, emphasis mine).

- A. Spirit Our innermost part.
- B. Soul Our mental, emotional part. Includes the mind, will, emotions, and conscience. Often called "personality."
- C. Body Our physical part.
- 2. You can feel both your body and your soul, but your spirit cannot be accessed in any natural way.

"That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit" (John 3:6).

- A. No direct connection between spirit and flesh (flesh = soul and body).
- B. Can't contact your spirit through your emotions or physical body.
- C. Understanding spirit, soul, and body unlocks the spirit realm so you can experience who you are and what you have in Christ.
- 3. God's Word is the only accurate way to perceive the spirit realm.

"It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life" (John 6:63).

- A. God's Word is spirit and life.
- B. God's Word reveals spiritual reality.
- 4. God's Word is a spiritual mirror.

"For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass: For he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was. But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty [God's Word—specifically the New Testament], and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed" (James 1:23-25, brackets mine).

- A. God's Word perfectly reflects who you are in the spirit.
- B. Trust the spiritual reality you see in the Word.

- C. The change occurred in your spirit (2 Cor. 5:17).
- 2. Your spirit totally changed at salvation.
  - A. Your spirit was instantly and completely transformed.
  - B. Everything you'll ever need in the Christian life is already present in its entirety in your spirit.
  - C. At this very moment, your born-again spirit is as perfect and complete as it'll ever be throughout all eternity.
  - D. Your spirit is—right now—as perfect, mature, and complete as Jesus Himself.

- 2. The diagram of three circles (appears like a target).




- A. The outer circle is your body. It's the part you can see and feel.
- B. The inner circle is your soul. It can't be seen, but can be felt. Also, it touches both your body and your spirit.
- C. The innermost circle is your spirit. Although it's the center of who you are, it can't be seen or felt. It's completely surrounded by your soul.
- 3. Your spirit is the core of your being, the real you, your life-giving part.
  - "For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also" (James 2:26).
  - "And the LORD God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Gen. 2:7).

#### 4. The diagram of three rings.



- A. Your spirit has no direct access to your physical body.
- B. Everything that comes out from your spirit to your body must go through your mental, emotional part.
- 5. The pipe diagram.



- A. Your soul acts as a valve in between your spirit and your body.
- B. The flow of God's supernatural life from your spirit to your body (natural realm) depends on how open your soul is.
- C. Can you see how pivotal your soul is?

## Renew, Acknowledge & Experience

Lesson 4 – Outline

- 1. Most Christians are dominated by what they can see, taste, hear, smell, and feel instead of God's Word.
  - A. The flow of life within stays turned off because they don't believe anything they can't see.
  - B. They don't understand the change that happened in their born-again spirits or who they are in Christ.
  - C. To them, something's just not "real" if it can't be perceived though their five natural senses.
- 2. The Christian life isn't a process of "getting from God"; it's a process of renewing your mind and learning to release what you've already received.
  - A. It's much easier to release something you've already got than to go get something you don't yet have.
  - B. Doubt is eliminated once you believe you've already got it.
- 3. Your faith becomes effective, productive, and operative by acknowledging every good thing in you (your spirit) in Christ.
  - "That the communication of thy faith may become effectual by the acknowledging of every good thing which is in you in Christ Jesus" (Philem. 6).
  - A. To communicate means to release or transfer.
  - B. "Effectual" means it begins to work or produce.
- 4. Under the New Covenant, we have all received (past tense) His fullness.
  - "And of his fulness have all we received, and grace for grace" (John 1:16).
  - A. God gave you everything when you were born again.
  - B. Old Testament principles don't necessarily apply to New Testament faith.
  - C. The rest of your Christian life is learning how to manifest in the physical realm what's already in your born-again spirit.

- 5. Most Christians believe God can do anything, but they experience very little.
  - A. They focus on what they need to do instead of what Christ has already done.
  - B. They don't doubt God's power, but His willingness to use it on their behalf.
  - C. They think His power is out there somewhere and that they must do things in order to obtain it.
- 6. When you were born again, God put His power, anointing, victory, joy, peace—everything—in you in abundance.
  - A. The only reason they don't manifest is your unrenewed mind.
  - B. God already gave, but you're still looking at the physical realm instead of His spiritual mirror.
  - C. Until the Second Coming of Christ, or when you die and go to Him, the Christian life is renewing your mind and acknowledging the perfection already in your spirit so that your soul and physical body can experience the benefits of salvation.
- 7. Don't be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind.
  - "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God" (Rom. 12:1-2).
  - A. To be conformed means to be poured into the mold of.
  - B. You can't avoid being melted, but you can choose which mold you'll be poured into.
  - C. "Transformed" is the picture of a worm metamorphosing into a butterfly.
  - D. Your mind, thoughts, and attitudes determine whether you experience victory and the life of God in your spirit, or the defeat and death of the fallen natural realm.
- 8. Renewing your mind to the Word facilitates your transformation.
  - A. God's Word gives you the new values and attitudes you should conform yourself to.
  - B. As you continually look into the Lord's spiritual mirror, you'll begin to see and experience yourself for who you really are.

# Reality—Carnal or Spiritual?

Lesson 5 – Outline

- 1. Carnal-mindedness is allowing your mind to be dominated by what you can see, taste, hear, smell, and feel.
  - "For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace" (Rom. 8:6).
  - A. "Carnal" means "sensual," or of the five senses.
  - B. Carnal-mindedness doesn't necessarily mean sinful-mindedness.
  - C. You are carnally minded when your thoughts center primarily on the physical realm.
- 2. Spiritual-mindedness releases the flow of God's life in you, but carnal-mindedness shuts it off.
  - A. Carnal-mindedness = death, and spiritual-mindedness = life and peace.
  - B. "Death" refers to anything that's a result of sin.
  - C. In this fallen world, being dominated by your natural senses produces death.
- 3. When your thoughts are dominated by what the Word says, you're spiritually minded.
  - "The words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life" (John 6:63b).
  - A. It doesn't matter what your physical circumstances may be. God can keep you in perfect peace.
    - "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee" (Is. 26:3).
  - B. As your mind stays on Him, your soul agrees with your spirit, and God's peace is released into your soul and body.
- 4. Believers shouldn't live like lost people who are trapped in their carnal, physical world.
  - "This I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that ye henceforth walk not as other Gentiles walk, in the vanity of their mind" (Eph. 4:17).
  - A. A Gentile was a non-Jew, someone not in covenant relationship with God.
  - B. Unbelievers don't use their minds to perceive spiritual truth.
- 5. If you don't renew your mind and use it to study and meditate God's Word, it will automatically gravitate toward what you can see, taste, hear, smell, and feel.

- "Having the understanding darkened" (Eph. 4:18a).
- A. The knowledge of God is critical, but it must be understood to be useful.
- B. Without understanding, you can't release the life in it.
- 6. When a Christian walks like an unbeliever, they get the same results—death.
  - A. When a believer's understanding is darkened, they are alienated from the life of God within them through ignorance.
    - "Alienated from the life of God through the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart" (Eph. 4:18b).
  - B. Most Christians live their lives separated from the life of God within due to their own ignorance of spiritual truth.
- 7. Lasciviousness is being controlled by what you feel.
  - "Who being past feeling have given themselves over unto lasciviousness, to work all uncleanness with greediness" (Eph. 4:19).
  - A. Most people have gone beyond simply receiving sensory input to being dominated by it.
  - B. Feelings were designed to follow what you think, not lead the way.

"This I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that ye henceforth walk not as other Gentiles walk, in the vanity of their mind, Having the understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God through the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart: Who being past feeling have given themselves over unto lasciviousness, to work all uncleanness with greediness" (Eph. 4:17-19).

"Who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed" (1 Pet. 2:24).

"The eyes of your understanding being enlightened; that ye may know what is the hope of his calling, and what the riches of the glory of his inheritance in the saints, And what is the exceeding greatness of his power to us-ward who believe, according to the working of his mighty power, Which he wrought in Christ, when he raised him from the dead, and set him at his own right hand in the heavenly places" (Eph. 1:18-20).

# **Righteous & Holy**

Lesson 6 – Outline

1. Your born-again spirit—the new man—was created after God in righteousness and true holiness.

"But ye have not so learned Christ; If so be that ye have heard him, and have been taught by him, as the truth is in Jesus: That ye put off concerning the former conversation the old man, which is corrupt according to the deceitful lusts; And be renewed in the spirit of your mind; And that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness" (Eph. 4:20-24).

- A. Recognize and acknowledge your true self in God's mirror.
- B. The degree of holiness you live outwardly may vary, but the nature of your born-again spirit is righteousness and true holiness.
- 2. You must worship God in spirit and truth.
  - "God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth" (John 4:24).
  - A. You cannot approach God unless you come to Him through the righteousness and true holiness of who you are in the spirit.
  - B. No matter how hard you try, you'll never measure up to God's perfection through your own efforts in the physical, emotional, and mental realms.
- 3. Jesus Himself literally became your righteousness.
  - "But of him are ye in Christ Jesus, who of God is made unto us wisdom, and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption" (1 Cor. 1:30).
  - A. Now that you're born again, one-third of your being is completely righteous.
  - B. Unlike your spirit, your body and soul are in process.
- 4. God can only accept you based on who you are in your born-again spirit.
  - A. Anyone who hasn't received the Lord but tries to approach Him based on who they are in their actions and thoughts will always fall short of His glory (Rom. 3:23).
  - B. People's performance simply cannot accomplish what only the new birth can—change their spiritual natures.

- 5. Fix your gaze on God's mirror.
  - A. God's mirror reflects you as righteous, holy, and pure.
  - B. As who you are in Christ grows stronger in your heart, carnal "reality" must give way to spiritual reality.

### One with Jesus

Lesson 7 – Outline

- 1. As Jesus is, so are you—right now—in this world.
  - "Herein is our love made perfect, that we may have boldness in the day of judgment: because as he is, so are we in this world" (1 John 4:17, emphasis mine).
  - A. It's not your body, nor your soul, but your spirit—the born-again part of you—that's as Jesus is.
  - B. Over time, you'll see radical changes manifest as you continue believing this truth and continue releasing God's corresponding power from within your born-again spirit.
- 2. You are one with Jesus Christ right now.
  - "But he that is joined unto the Lord is one spirit" (1 Cor. 6:17).
  - A. "One" means "a single (one), to the exclusion of others" (Vine's Expository Dictionary).
  - B. In your spirit, you are completely one with Him.
- 3. You can believe and experience these truths.
  - A. You can be transformed by renewing your mind to the point where you prove—manifest to your physical senses—the good, acceptable, and perfect will of God (Rom. 12:1-2).
  - B. By embracing the Word, you'll be able to see the perfection that's in your spirit start flowing out through your soul and body to impact your life and those God touches through you.
- 4. If you think that what you can see, taste, hear, smell, and feel is all there is to reality, you won't be able to walk in all of God's will.
  - A. You won't experience the power and ability of God within if you can't perceive things beyond your body and soul.
  - B. If you think that God's power is with Him somewhere out there, you'll doubt you can ever attain it and will eventually become discouraged.
  - C. You must believe you are one with Him in spirit and that it's your responsibility to release His power from within in order to see it manifest.
- 5. As I kept digging into God's Word, I realized that I'm not just a man anymore.
  - A. One-third of me is complete, identical to and one with Jesus, and wall-to-wall Holy Ghost.

В.	Because of the confidence, security, and faith this has given me, I can confront and overcome
	problems now that I wasn't able to before.

C. As you keep digging, these truths will do the same for you.

#### Lesson 8 – Outline

A newly born-again believer will often become vulnerable to discouragement, doubt, and unbelief because they don't understand that the change took place in their spirit and that the rest of their Christian life involves renewing their mind to believe and release what God has already put inside them.
  - A. Looking only in the physical realm, it's easy for them to conclude, "It didn't work. The Word isn't true. God didn't change me, because everything's still the same."
  - B. The devil wants to stop your witness, so he'll often throw everything he has at you as soon as you're born again.
- 3. Jesus became sin so you could become righteous.
  - "For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him" (2 Cor. 5:21).
  - A. Jesus became what you were so that you could become what He is.
  - B. He took your sin and gave you His righteousness.
  - C. If you believe the first half of 2 Corinthians 5:21, then you ought to believe the second half too.
  - D. God sees you as righteous and truly holy because He's looking at your spirit.
- 4. God is pleased with you.
  - "Having predestinated us unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ to himself, according to the good pleasure of his will, To the praise of the glory of his grace, wherein he hath made us accepted in the beloved" (Eph. 1:5-6).
  - A. The same Greek word translated "accepted" was also translated "highly favoured."
    - "And the angel [Gabriel] came in unto her [Mary], and said, Hail, thou that art *highly favoured*, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women" (Luke 1:28, brackets and emphasis mine).
  - B. As the woman who bore Christ was accepted, so are you highly favored of the Lord.

5. Once you believed, you were sealed with the Holy Spirit.

"In whom ye also trusted, after that ye heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation: in whom also after that ye believed, ye were sealed with that holy Spirit of promise" (Eph. 1:13).

- A. All the righteousness, holiness, and goodness your born-again spirit was recreated with was immediately sealed tight with the Holy Spirit.
- B. When you were born again, your spirit was immediately encased—vacuum packed—by the Holy Spirit for the purpose of preservation.
- C. When you fail in any area of your life after being saved, the rottenness, uncleanness, and defilement that comes to your body and soul doesn't penetrate your spirit.
- D. This Holy Spirit seal keeps the good in and the bad out.
- 6. Sin isn't only doing something wrong by violating a command; it's also not doing something right that you should have done.

"Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin" (James 4:17).

- A. According to God's definition of sin, everyone constantly falls short.
- B. If you don't understand that the Holy Spirit encased your born-again spirit, your conscience will eventually give you the impression that you've lost the righteousness and true holiness your spirit was created in.
- 7. When you sin, your spirit doesn't participate.

"Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed remaineth in him: and he cannot sin, because he is born of God" (1 John 3:9).

- A. You are as righteous and holy in your spirit now as you will ever be.
- B. No matter how you're performing in your body and soul, you can always approach God through who you are in your born-again spirit.

## **Eternal Redemption**

Lesson 9 – Outline

- 1. What we've received through Jesus in the New Covenant is far superior to the Old.
  - A. Old Testament sacrifices were symbolic and had to be offered over and over again.
  - B. Jesus gave His life once—as the perfect sacrifice for sin—and it never again needs to be repeated.
- 2. Your born-again spirit never needs to be re-cleansed, re-purged, or born again, again.

"But Christ being come an high priest of good things to come, by a greater and more perfect tabernacle, not made with hands, that is to say, not of this building; Neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us" (Heb. 9:11-12).

3. Your salvation is eternal.

"For if the blood of bulls and of goats, and the ashes of an heifer sprinkling the unclean, sanctifieth to the purifying of the flesh: How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God? And for this cause he is the mediator of the new testament, that by means of death, for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance" (Heb. 9:13-15).

4. Jesus entered once into the holy place and made one sacrifice.

"For Christ is not entered into the holy places made with hands, which are the figures of the true; but into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God for us: Nor yet that he should offer himself often, as the high priest entereth into the holy place every year with blood of others; For then must he often have suffered since the foundation of the world: but now *once* in the end of the world hath he appeared to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself. And as it is appointed unto men *once* to die, but after this the judgment: So Christ was *once* offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for him shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation" (Heb. 9:24-28, emphasis mine).

- 5. The Old Testament sacrifices couldn't do what the New Testament sacrifice of Jesus did.
  - A. They were only temporary shadows of the real thing to come.

- "For the law having a shadow of good things to come, and not the very image of the things, can never with those sacrifices which they offered year by year continually make the comers thereunto perfect. For then would they not have ceased to be offered? because that the worshippers once purged should have had no more conscience of sins" (Heb. 10:1-2).
- B. If the Old Testament sacrifices really could have made the people perfect, they wouldn't have had to be offered over and over again.
- C. If they had worked, the worshipers—once purged—should have had no more conscience of sin.
- 6 New Testament believers need not be conscious of sin
  - A. If you focus your thoughts on who you are in the spirit, you'll be conscious of righteousness.
  - B. Draw near to God boldly because you are now the righteousness of God in Christ.
    - "For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him" (2 Cor. 5:21).
- 7. "Eternal redemption" means that you've been forgiven of your sins—past, present, and even future tense sins.
  - A. You were sanctified—separated, made holy—through the offering of Jesus Christ once for all time.
    - "By the which will we are sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all" (Heb. 10:10).
  - B. The context proves that Hebrews 10:10 means one sacrifice made you holy for all time.
    - "And every priest standeth daily ministering and offering oftentimes the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins: But this man [Jesus], after he had offered one sacrifice for sins for ever, sat down on the right hand of God; From henceforth expecting till his enemies be made his footstool. For by one offering he hath perfected for ever them that are sanctified" (Heb. 10:11-14, emphasis and brackets mine).
- 8. Christ's one offering perfected and sanctified you forever.
  - "To the general assembly and church of the firstborn, which are written in heaven, and to God the Judge of all, and to the spirits of just men made perfect" (Heb. 12:23, emphasis mine).
  - A. David saw by faith, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, just how great salvation would be

"Even as David also describeth the blessedness of the man, unto whom God imputeth righteousness without works, saying, Blessed are they whose iniquities are forgiven, and whose sins are covered [past and present tense sins]. Blessed is the man to whom the Lord will not [future tense] impute sin" (Rom. 4:6-8, quoted from Ps. 32:1-2, brackets mine).

In Psalm 32:2, David even added,

"And in whose spirit there is no guile."

B. Because of your born-again spirit's righteous nature, the Lord no longer holds any sin against you.

- 2. People ask, "Since God will love me and I won't lose my right standing with Him no matter what, can I just go live in sin?"
  - "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid" (Rom. 6:1-2).
  - A. Unless this question comes up, you aren't preaching the same Gospel as the Apostle Paul.
  - B. Typical teaching today produces a works-righteousness (self-righteousness based on your actions) in most believers because it ties God's love and acceptance to your performance.
  - C. Righteousness is not based on your actions.
- 3. "Are you saying it doesn't matter how I live?"
  - A. If you are truly born again, God has changed your nature.
    - "How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein? Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death?" (Rom. 6:2-3).
  - B. If you're truly born again, you have a desire to live for God.
    - "And every man that hath this hope in him purifieth himself, even as he is pure" (1 John 3:3).
  - C. Sin gives Satan access to your body and soul.
    - "Know ye not, that to whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey; whether of sin unto death, or of obedience unto righteousness?" (Rom. 6:16).
  - D. It's to your advantage to live holy, because your actions and attitude determine how you get along with other people.
- 4. Knowing that I can relate to God based on the perfection, holiness, and righteousness in my spirit has set me free *from* sin—not *to* sin.
  - A. This makes my relationship with Him stable and secure.

- B. I've lived a holier life accidentally than most people ever have on purpose.
- C. I live holy because I want to, not because I have to.
- 5. God would still love me if I lived in sin (because my spirit is changed), but I wouldn't love me, and other people wouldn't love me either.
  - A. Living holy doesn't make God love you more, but it does increase your love for Him.
  - B. A lack of holiness won't cause God to love you less, but it will definitely decrease your love for Him.
  - C. Although God's love for you doesn't change, your performance directly affects your love for Him.
- 6. Sin is never a wise choice, but it's also never an issue between you and God.
  - A. He dealt with your sin—past, present, and future—when you were born again.
  - B. You can still come boldly into the very presence of your Father and receive from Him because your spirit didn't lose any of its right standing with Him.
    - "Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need" (Heb. 4:16).
  - C. Your heavenly Father has invited you to draw near to His throne at any time by faith in His Son and who you are in Him.

Without understanding how everything changed when Jesus Christ came, you'll think God is schizophrenic. I assure you, He's not!

  - B. Both positions have a partial truth, but the full truth is somewhere in between.
- 2. The Law is like a plate glass window.
  - A. If you violate one tiny command, you're guilty of breaking the whole thing.
    - "For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all" (James 2:10).
  - B. Therefore, everyone falls short.
  - C. According to God's Word, there is no such thing as a "big" sin or a "little" sin.
- 3. If you've come short of the glory of God, you've missed it.
  - A. God doesn't grade on a curve.
  - B. Either you have to be perfect, or you need a Savior who was.
  - C. Nobody always does all of the good they know to do (James 4:17).
- 4. Your spirit has been sealed, sanctified, and perfected forever.
  - A. Since salvation depends solely upon putting your faith in Jesus and being born again, your sin doesn't affect your relationship with God.
  - B. He fellowships with you based on your faith in Christ alone.
- 5. Scripture doesn't teach "once saved, always saved."
  - "For it is impossible for those who were once enlightened, and have tasted of the heavenly gift, and were made partakers of the Holy Ghost, And have tasted the good word of God, and the powers of the world to come, If they shall fall away, to renew them again unto repentance; seeing they crucify to themselves the Son of God afresh, and put him to an open shame" (Heb. 6:4-6).
  - A. If a person falls away, there's no more sacrifice.
  - B. You can make the sacrifice of Christ of no effect by turning to legalism and trusting in your own works for righteousness.

"O foolish Galatians, who hath bewitched you, that ye should not obey the truth, before whose eyes Jesus Christ hath been evidently set forth, crucified among you? This only would I learn of you, Received ye the Spirit by the works of the law, or by the hearing of faith? Are ye so foolish? having begun in the Spirit, are ye now made perfect by the flesh?" (Gal. 3:1-3).

- C. Salvation is both received and maintained by faith in Christ alone.
- 6. You can't sin your salvation away, but you can renounce it.
  - A. It's not something you just lose. You must deliberately and openly reject it.
  - B. Although sinful actions don't cause you to lose your salvation, sin can harden your heart until you eventually come to a place where *you* renounce your faith in the Lord.
- 7. You can't renounce your salvation ignorantly.
  - A. The qualifications listed in Hebrews 6:4-6 are pretty stiff.
  - B. You have to be a mature Christian who was drawn by the Spirit, born again, baptized in the Holy Ghost, mature in the Word, and operating in the gifts of the Holy Spirit before you can reject the Lord.
  - C. You aren't reprobate if the Holy Spirit is still dealing with you.

## Once Saved, Always Saved or Born Again, Again?

Lesson 11 – Additional Information

In order to qualify as a biblical reprobate, you have to meet some very stiff requirements.

You have to (1) be enlightened, which means drawn by the Holy Ghost. John 6:44 declares:

"No man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him."

You couldn't have been coerced into making some statement, signing a church roll, or repeating a prayer. Then, after not experiencing a dramatic change, you became tired and renounced it, saying, "I reject this. It's not real!" If this describes you, it wasn't a true conviction from the Holy Spirit. You were coerced, not drawn. You went to church because your parents made you, or you were dating someone who had you repeat a prayer. You don't qualify! Therefore, you aren't even held accountable for that so-called "rejection."

You also must have (2) tasted of the heavenly gift, which means you must be truly born again; (3) made a partaker of the Holy Ghost, which refers to being baptized in the Holy Spirit; (4) have tasted the good Word of God, which means the Word has literally impacted you. You've done more than just put it in your mouth—you've swallowed it, digested it, and benefited from the nutrients and life in it; and (5) you've tasted the power of the world to come, which refers to a Spirit-filled person who has exercised the gifts of the Holy Spirit and is going on to maturity. In other words, you must be a mature Christian before you can actually renounce your salvation.

If a mature Christian rejects the Lord, they can never be brought back to a place of repentance. It's a one-time deal. They're held accountable, damned, and that's it.

Jesus proclaimed that blasphemy against the Holy Spirit was the one unpardonable sin (Matt. 12:31-32). Yet Paul said he obtained mercy because he "did it ignorantly in unbelief" (1 Tim. 1:13). This shows that even the unpardonable sin of blaspheming the Holy Spirit depends upon whether or not you did it knowingly.

#### **Beyond Hope**

When someone rejects their salvation, they can never come back into relationship with God.

"And even as they did not like to retain God in their knowledge, God gave them over to a reprobate mind, to do those things which are not convenient.... Who knowing the judgment of God, that they which commit such things are worthy of death, not only do the same, but have pleasure in them that do them" (Rom. 1:28 and 32).

Giving them over to a reprobate mind, God takes away the conviction of the Holy Spirit.

"Reprobate" means beyond hope. You aren't convicted of your need for relationship with

the Lord unless the Holy Spirit is dealing with you (John 6:44). As long as He's dealing with you, you aren't reprobate. However, if someone fulfills the qualifications of Hebrews 6:4-6 and renounces their salvation, then God takes the Holy Spirit away and they become reprobate. Without conviction, they no longer know they're doing wrong. Not only do they like it, but they like all those who are in rebellion against God too. Reprobates display a total lack of desire and response toward the Lord.

Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation. For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to the evil. Wilt thou then not be afraid of the power? do that which is good, and thou shalt have praise of the same: For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil, be afraid; for he beareth not the sword in vain: for he is the minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil. Wherefore ye must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience sake. For this cause pay ye tribute also: for they are God's ministers, attending continually upon this very thing. Render therefore to all their dues: tribute to whom tribute is due; custom to whom custom; fear to whom fear; honour to whom honour" (Rom. 13:1-7).

"For it is impossible for those who were once enlightened, and have tasted of the heavenly gift, and were made partakers of the Holy Ghost, And have tasted the good word of God, and the powers of the world to come, If they shall fall away, to renew them again unto repentance; seeing they crucify to themselves the Son of God afresh, and put him to an open shame" (Heb. 6:4-6).

#### **Fullness Received**

Lesson 12 – Outline

- 1. First John 1:9 has been traditionally taught that every time you sin, you have to confess it in order to receive forgiveness.
  - "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9).
  - A. If you have to confess every sin before it's forgiven, nobody could retain their salvation.
  - B. This just can't be what it means.
- 2. First John 1:9 refers to when you first come to the Lord.
  - A. This verse instructs the unbeliever to be born again, not the believer to confess every sin all the time.
  - B. You confess that you're a sinner in need of forgiveness and are cleansed from all unrighteousness by receiving your brand-new, born-again spirit.
- 3. First John 1:9 can also mean cleansing the effects of sin from a believer's soul and body.
  - A. Your spirit isn't affected by sin, but your soul and body are.
  - B. Sin gives the devil a legal right to work his death into your life because you yielded yourself to him (Rom. 6:16).
  - C. By confessing, you take the salvation, the forgiveness, the holiness, and the righteousness that's already a reality in your spirit and which didn't fluctuate when you failed, and draw it out into your body and soul.
  - D. This literally drives the devil out and takes his place away, because he no longer has rights and privileges in your life once you repent and turn away from what you've done.
- 4. Understanding your eternal redemption will cause you to live holy.
  - A. You'll desire to live holy so that nothing will ever dull you or keep you from perceiving these great truths and His love.
  - B. Holiness is a fruit—not a root—of salvation (Rom. 6:22).
  - C. Holiness doesn't produce God moving in your life, but your external actions of holiness are a result of understanding the righteous nature of your born-again spirit.

  - D. You'll be so appreciative of what God has done that you'll live holier in your actions accidentally than you've ever lived on purpose.

## God's Supernatural Faith

Lesson 13 – Outline

- 1. In your spirit, you have the complete measure of faith.
  - A. You don't need more faith from God, because you already have all you'll ever need.
  - B. Your faith isn't small, immature, or in the process of growing; it's already as perfect and complete as the faith of Jesus.
  - C. You just need to renew your mind and learn to release it.
- 2. The way you were born again is the way you receive everything in the Christian life—by grace through faith.
  - "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast" (Eph. 2:8-9).
  - A. Salvation is everything God provided through Christ's atonement—forgiveness of sins, healing, deliverance, prosperity, joy, peace, love, etc.
  - B. All these salvation benefits come the same way you were born again—by grace through faith.
    - "As ye have therefore received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk ye in him" (Col. 2:6).
  - C. God not only provides the salvation you need, but He also supplies the very faith you use to appropriate His grace.
  - D. Both salvation and the faith to receive it are gifts from God.
- 3. You can't receive salvation without hearing the Word.
  - "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Rom. 10:17).
  - A. God's Word contains His faith.
  - B. When you receive the Word into your heart, you're receiving God's supernatural faith.
  - C. The faith you use to receive salvation is not mere human faith but God's own supernatural faith, which came to you through His Word.
  - D. It's not only the faith you used to become born again, but it's the faith you use to appropriate everything in the Christian life.

- 4. Human faith is based upon natural knowledge.

- 6. The same faith you used to become born again is now always present in your spirit.
  - A. Faith is a fruit that stems from your spirit.
    - "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, *faith*, Meekness, temperance: against such things there is no law" (Gal. 5:22-23, emphasis mine).
  - B. Faith—belief—is a product from deep within the heart, not just the mind.
    - "For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness" (Rom. 10:10a).
  - C. As you cooperate with the laws that govern how faith works, you'll find that the faith that's already inside you is more than sufficient for any problem you'll ever face.

#### Like Precious Faith

Lesson 14 – Outline

- 1. You were justified by the faith of Christ.
  - "Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law, but by the faith of Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Jesus Christ, that we might be justified by the faith of Christ, and not by the works of the law: for by the works of the law shall no flesh be justified" (Gal. 2:16, emphasis mine).
- 2. God not only provided salvation but also gave you the faith to receive it.
  - A. Not only were you born again through that faith, but you're to live your entire Christian life by it.
    - "I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh *I live by the faith of the Son of God*, who loved me, and gave himself for me" (Gal. 2:20, emphasis mine).
  - B. It's not just a human faith that receives from God but His own supernatural faith.
- 3. The first step is to believe you have this faith, but the goal is to release its benefits into your soul and body.
  - A. You don't have a faith deficiency; you have a knowledge problem.
  - B. If you don't acknowledge this faith and learn how to use it, then you won't see it manifest.
- 4. Every born-again believer has been given *the* measure of faith.
  - "For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith" (Rom. 12:3, emphasis mine).
  - A. You received the exact same quantity and quality of faith when you were born again as did every other Christian.
  - B. Some people are using more of their measure of faith than others.
- 5. Both Paul and Peter had this faith.
  - A. If Paul lived by the faith of the Son of God, then that means every other born-again believer like him also has the faith of the Son of God (Gal. 2:20 and Rom. 12:3).

- B. Second Peter was written to a group of believers who had already obtained this "like precious faith."
  - "Simon Peter, a servant and an apostle of Jesus Christ, to them that have obtained like precious faith with us through the righteousness of God and our Saviour Jesus Christ" (2 Pet. 1:1).
- C. Paul and Peter lived their lives by the faith of the Son of God—and you can too.
- 6. You have the same faith as Jesus.
  - A. You might not have all of it operating the way He did, but it's there.
  - B. Your soul, like a filter, screens what flows out from your spirit into the physical realm.
  - C. As you continue renewing your mind, more of God's supernatural faith that's in you will be free to manifest.

#### Like Precious Faith

Lesson 14 – Scriptures

"Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do? Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost. For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call. And with many other words did he testify and exhort, saying, Save yourselves from this untoward generation. Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls" (Acts 2:37-41).

"Then Peter said, Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee: In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk. And he took him by the right hand, and lifted him up: and immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength" (Acts 3:6-7).

"Insomuch that they brought forth the sick into the streets, and laid them on beds and couches, that at the least the shadow of Peter passing by might overshadow some of them. There came also a multitude out of the cities round about unto Jerusalem, bringing sick folks, and them which were vexed with unclean spirits: and they were healed every one" (Acts 5:15-16).

"Now there was at Joppa a certain disciple named Tabitha, which by interpretation is called Dorcas: this woman was full of good works and almsdeeds which she did. And it came to pass in those days, that she was sick, and died: whom when they had washed, they laid her in an upper chamber. And forasmuch as Lydda was nigh to Joppa, and the disciples had heard that Peter was there, they sent unto him two men, desiring him that he would not delay to come to them. Then Peter arose and went with them. When he was come, they brought him into the upper chamber: and all the widows stood by him weeping, and shewing the coats and garments which Dorcas made, while she was with them. But Peter put them all forth, and kneeled down, and prayed; and turning him to the body said, Tabitha, arise. And she opened her eyes: and when she saw Peter, she sat up. And he gave her his hand, and lifted her up, and when he had called the saints and widows, presented her alive" (Acts 9:36-41).

"And Jesus said unto them, Because of your unbelief: for verily I say unto you, If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, Remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you" (Matt. 17:20).

## **Your Spirit Knows All Things**

Lesson 15 – Outline

1. Your born-again spirit came with the mind of Christ.

"For who hath known the mind of the Lord, that he may instruct him? But we have the mind of Christ" (1 Cor. 2:16).

- A. In your spirit, there's a mind that already knows all things.
- B. The rest of the Christian life is learning how to draw it out into the physical realm.
- C. When that happens, you experience what's called revelation knowledge.
- 2. You were born with a natural mind.
  - A. It operates both in the soulish realm and in the physical realm as your brain.
  - B. Your natural mind had to be educated and trained.
- 3. When you were born again, you received the mind of Christ in your spirit.
  - A. Your spirit mind doesn't have to be developed, trained, or taught, because it was born again in perfect knowledge.
  - B. First Corinthians 13:9-10 refers to your natural mind in your soulish realm not being totally renewed until you receive that which is perfect—your glorified body.
  - C. The mind of Christ in your spirit is already complete.
- 4. Your spirit mind and physical mind are two separate entities within you.
  - A. When they don't agree, double-mindedness occurs.
    - "Purify your hearts, ye double minded" (James 4:8b).
  - B. The key to the Christian life is training your physical mind to agree with your spirit mind, which is the mind of Christ.
- 5. Your spirit mind always thinks the way God thinks.
  - A. The Word perfectly represents what you think in your spirit.
  - B. If your physical mind agrees, then you'll see supernatural power and ability flow through your soul into your body, which produces results in the physical realm.

- C. If your physical mind disagrees, then you're double-minded and you will receive nothing from the Lord.
- 6. Single-mindedness brings stability, but double-mindedness causes instability.

"If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him. But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering. For he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed. For let not that man think that he shall receive any thing of the Lord. A double minded man is unstable in all his ways" (James 1:5-8).


- A. The mind of Christ is in your spirit, but your soul doesn't automatically think that way.
- B. It takes effort to renew your physical mind to agree with your spirit mind.
- C. Basically, this is where the conflict in the Christian life is—in the mind.
- 7. In your spirit, you know all things.

"But ye have an unction from the Holy One, and ye know all things" (1 John 2:20).

- A. "Unction" simply means an anointing, a special endowment of power, or an ability.
- B. The "Holy One" is Jesus.
- C. "All" basically means to the exclusion of nothing.
- D. In your spiritual mind, you know everything Jesus knows.

## Your Spirit Knows All Things

"If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him. But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering. For he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed. For let not that man think that he shall receive any thing of the Lord. A double minded man is unstable in all his ways" (James 1:5-8).

"But ye have an unction from the Holy One, and ye know all things" (1 John 2:20).

### **Releasing the Mind of Christ**

Lesson 16 – Outline

- 1. Studying God's Word will draw out the wisdom that's in your spirit.
  - A. When you're reading the Bible, you are receiving words with your physical eyes that are spirit and life.
  - B. As you take this knowledge into your soul, new thoughts and ideas come to your physical mind
  - C. When this happens, your spirit—which already has the truth and mind of Christ—will bear witness with it.
  - D. Several scriptures reveal this inner witness.
    - "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God" (Rom. 8:16).
    - "He that believeth on the Son of God hath the witness in himself" (1 John 5:10a).
- 2. Studying God's Word is vital for achieving single-mindedness and releasing God's power.
  - A. When a truth from God's Word takes root in your soulish realm, that same knowledge, which has already existed in your spirit mind, rises up and meshes with it.
  - B. This draws God's power resident within you out into the physical realm.
- 3. Praying in tongues is another powerful way to release the mind of Christ.
  - "Follow after charity, and desire spiritual gifts, but rather that ye may prophesy. For he that speaketh in an unknown tongue speaketh not unto men, but unto God: for no man understandeth him; howbeit in the spirit he speaketh mysteries" (1 Cor. 14:1-2).
  - A. When you pray in tongues, your spirit prays.
    - "For if I pray in an unknown tongue, my spirit prayeth, but my understanding is unfruitful" (1 Cor. 14:14).
  - B. Your spirit prays, but your understanding—your soulish, physical, natural mind—is unfruitful.
- 4. You build yourself up by praying in tongues.
  - "He that speaketh in an unknown tongue edifieth himself" (1 Cor. 14:4a).

- A. "Edify" means "the act of building . . . the promotion of spiritual growth" (*Vine's Expository Dictionary*).
- B. Your goal is to facilitate single-mindedness.
- C. As your soul unites to your spirit's way of thinking, you're built up by drawing your spirit's wisdom and knowledge out into the physical realm.
- 5. When you pray in tongues, your spirit prays the hidden wisdom of God.
  - "Howbeit in the spirit he speaketh mysteries" (1 Cor. 14:2b).
  - "The wisdom of God in a mystery, even the hidden wisdom, which God ordained before the world unto our glory" (1 Cor. 2:7).
  - A. Since you cannot really understand the things of God with just your natural mind, you must understand them through your spirit man.
  - B. Paul preached the hidden wisdom of God that he received by revelation (1 Cor. 2).
    - "I speak with tongues more than ye all" (1 Cor. 14:18).
- 6. Simeon recognized the Christ child by revelation knowledge.
  - "And it was revealed unto him by the Holy Ghost, that he should not see death, before he had seen the Lord's Christ. And he came by the Spirit into the temple: and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him after the custom of the law, Then took he him up in his arms, and blessed God" (Luke 2:26-28).
  - A. Revelation knowledge comes from the inside out, not the outside in.
  - B. The mind of Christ in your born-again spirit reaches up from inside and grabs that truth, shouting, "Yes! This one's true. This one is for you!"
- 7. When you pray in tongues, you can believe God for interpretation.
  - "Wherefore let him that speaketh in an unknown tongue pray that he may interpret" (1 Cor. 14:13).
  - A. Whether you receive interpretation or not, praying in tongues relieves stress and releases the peace of God into your body and soul.
    - "For with stammering lips and another tongue will he speak to this people. To whom he said, This is the rest wherewith ye may cause the weary to rest; and this is the refreshing" (Is. 28:11-12).

- B. Since you are praying from the mind of Christ, why wouldn't you want to interpret?
- C. Meditating on God's Word, speaking in tongues, and receiving interpretation is the fast track to single-mindedness and manifestation.

### **Releasing the Mind of Christ**

Lesson 16 – Scriptures

"The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God" (Rom. 8:16).

"This is he that came by water and blood, even Jesus Christ; not by water only, but by water and blood. And it is the Spirit that beareth witness, because the Spirit is truth. For there are three that bear record in heaven, the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost: and these three are one. And there are three that bear witness in earth, the spirit, and the water, and the blood: and these three agree in one. If we receive the witness of men, the witness of God is greater: for this is the witness of God which he hath testified of his Son. He that believeth on the Son of God hath the witness in himself: he that believeth not God hath made him a liar; because he believeth not the record that God gave of his Son" (1 John 5:6-10).

"Follow after charity, and desire spiritual gifts, but rather that ye may prophesy. For he that speaketh in an unknown tongue speaketh not unto men, but unto God: for no man understandeth him; howbeit in the spirit he speaketh mysteries" (1 Cor. 14:1-2).

"Wherefore let him that speaketh in an unknown tongue pray that he may interpret. For if I pray in an unknown tongue, my spirit prayeth, but my understanding is unfruitful" (1 Cor. 14:13-14).

"He that speaketh in an unknown tongue edifieth himself; but he that prophesieth edifieth the church" (1 Cor. 14:4).

"But we speak the wisdom of God in a mystery, even the hidden wisdom, which God ordained before the world unto our glory" (1 Cor. 2:7).

"And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power" (1 Cor. 2:4).

"But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him. But God hath revealed them unto us by his Spirit: for the Spirit searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God. For what man knoweth the things of a man, save the spirit of man which is in him? even so the things of God knoweth no man, but the Spirit of God. Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but the spirit which is of God; that we might know the things that are freely given to us of God. . . . For who hath known the mind of the Lord, that he may instruct him? But we have the mind of Christ" (1 Cor. 2:9-12 and 16).

"I thank my God, I speak with tongues more than ye all: Yet in the church I had rather speak five words with my understanding, that by my voice I might teach others also, than ten thousand words in an unknown tongue" (1 Cor. 14:18-19).

"And it was revealed unto him by the Holy Ghost, that he should not see death, before he had seen the Lord's Christ. And he came by the Spirit into the temple: and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him after the custom of the law, Then took he him up in his arms, and blessed God" (Luke 2:26-28).

"For with stammering lips and another tongue will he speak to this people. To whom he said, This is the rest wherewith ye may cause the weary to rest; and this is the refreshing: yet they would not hear" (Is. 28:11-12).

"For since the beginning of the world men have not heard, nor perceived by the ear, neither hath the eye seen, O God, beside thee, what he hath prepared for him that waiteth for him" (Is. 64:4).

"But the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned" (1 Cor. 2:14).

### **Empowerment Required**

Lesson 17 – Outline

- 1. God has imparted perfect wisdom and complete revelation into your born-again spirit.
  - "Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom: and with all thy getting get understanding" (Prov. 4:7).
  - A. Wisdom and understanding are keys that will unlock anything else in life you need.
  - B. Therefore, draw on that wisdom and receive understanding so the floodgates of your soul will open up to allow God's truths already in your spirit to manifest in the physical realm.
- 2. Without the empowerment of the Holy Spirit, you won't be able to fully release all of these wonderful realities already present in your born-again spirit.
  - A. The Holy Spirit is the one who releases the wisdom and revelation of God.
    - "But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you" (John 14:26).
  - B. He comforts, teaches, reminds, guides into all truth, listens, speaks, shows things to come, glorifies Jesus, and receives of Him and shows it by revelation to you.
    - "I have yet many things to say unto you, but ye cannot bear them now. Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth: for he shall not speak of himself; but whatsoever he shall hear, that shall he speak: and he will shew you things to come. He shall glorify me: for he shall receive of mine, and shall shew it unto you" (John 16:12-14).
- 3. When you receive the baptism in the Holy Spirit, the ability to pray in tongues comes with it.
  - A. As you pray in the Spirit, you draw on and release the wisdom that's in the born-again part of you.
  - B. It's not the only way, but it's certainly one of the primary ways.
- 4. The baptism in the Holy Spirit is a second, separate experience from salvation.
  - A. You are endowed with power by the Holy Ghost and the gift of speaking in tongues, which will help you operate this power.
  - B. Speaking in tongues produces tremendous spiritual benefits.

- 5. If you aren't baptized in the Holy Spirit and speaking in tongues, you're really missing out.
  - A. In fact, you're probably frustrated and powerless in your Christian life.
  - B. Will you obey the Lord's command?

"Receive ye the Holy Ghost" (John 20:22b).

### Spirit vs. Flesh

Lesson 18 – Outline

- 1. Once you're born again, the rest of the Christian life is learning to walk in the Spirit, which is letting what God has done through the new birth dominate you more than your physical, emotional realm.
- 2. One of the hardest things you'll ever do is learn how to turn from your natural self-rule and let who you are in Christ dominate instead.
  - A. It's difficult because you must perceive your spirit by faith in God's Word because you can't see or feel it.
  - B. All you have to do is start basing your thoughts, actions, and identity on who you are in Christ.
- 3. As long as your flesh is contrary to your spirit, you'll have conflict.

"This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would. But if ye be led of the Spirit, ye are not under the law" (Gal. 5:16-18).

- A. "Contrary" means they're opposite, enemies, and adversaries.
- B. This conflict between your spirit and flesh is your true spiritual warfare.
- 4. You cannot please God in your flesh.

"So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God" (Rom. 8:8).

A. Living after the flesh brings all forms of death.

"Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die: but if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live" (Rom. 8:12-13).

"For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23a).

- B. Your flesh is Satan's inroad to bring death into your life.
- C. As a born-again believer, your flesh is made up of your soulish and physical realms.
- 5. As Paul taught how God now deals with people based on His grace, not their performance, this raised the question in Romans 6:1:

"What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound?"

- A. The answer, of course, is no.
  - "God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?" (Rom. 6:2).
- B. Your spirit is the part of you that's dead to sin.
- C. Your body and soul can still do sinful things, but the born-again part of you cannot.
- 6. When you were born again, you were baptized into His death.
  - "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death?" (Rom. 6:3).
  - A. Being baptized into His death is automatic, but walking in newness of life isn't.
    - "Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:4, emphasis mine).
  - B. Manifesting newness of life is something that should happen, but it depends on how you renew your mind.
    - "For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection: Knowing this" (Rom. 6:5-6a).
- 7. Your spirit died to sin, cannot sin, and has no desire for sin, but this doesn't automatically mean that your soul and body will reflect that change.
  - A. Your walking in resurrection life depends upon you:
    - "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin" (Rom. 6:6).
  - B. "Old man" refers to the spirit you had prior to salvation.
  - C. Your "old man" no longer exists because it's been crucified, has died, and was buried with Christ.
  - D. Your new self is now who you are in the spirit.
  - E. What you're dealing with is the spirit vs. the flesh.

### Spirit vs. Flesh

Lesson 18 – Scriptures

"It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life" (John 6:63).

"For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass: For he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was. But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed" (James 1:23-25).

"For we walk by faith, not by sight" (2 Cor. 5:7).

"This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would. But if ye be led of the Spirit, ye are not under the law" (Gal. 5:16-18).

"So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God" (Rom. 8:8).

"Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die: but if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live" (Rom. 8:12-13).

"For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Rom. 6:23).

"What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein? Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection: Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin" (Rom. 6:1-6).

"For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free; and have been all made to drink into one Spirit" (1 Cor. 12:13).

"And you hath he quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins" (Eph. 2:1).

### Walk in the Spirit

Lesson 19 – Outline

- 1. Your old self was crucified with Him, but then the body of sin has to be destroyed.
  - "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin" (Rom. 6:6).
- 2. When you die physically, you leave a body behind.
  - "For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also" (James 2:26).
  - A. Physical death occurs when your spirit leaves your body.
  - B. Even though your spirit is gone, your physical body can look exactly the same as it did during life for a brief period of time.
- 3. When you were born again, your old sin nature left behind a body.
  - A. Your old self was crucified, has died, and now is gone, but its effects are still being felt through your physical body and unrenewed mind.
  - B. Your natural mind was programmed to act like the child of the devil that you were before receiving the Lord (Eph. 2:1-2).
  - C. This means your physical mind will continue functioning like a computer under its prior programming until you renew it to God's Word.
- 4. You have one nature, but two minds.
  - A. You only have one nature—the new one.
  - B. But you do have two different minds—the unrenewed mind (flesh) and the mind of Christ (spirit).
  - C. As you reprogram/renew your natural mind to think like your spirit, you'll experience the life and power of God within you.
- 5. Your physical mind decides whether you'll be dominated by your spirit or your flesh.
  - A. If you don't renew it with God's Word, your natural mind will automatically gravitate toward what it can see, taste, hear, smell, and feel.
  - B. You must get into God's Word and mix it with faith in order to be led by your spirit.

- "Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh" (Gal. 5:16).
- C. You can mistake something that comes so naturally to you today as your "nature," when in reality, it's something you learned.
- D. The reason you still do some of the things you do is because you haven't renewed your mind.
- 6. After you've been born again, the "flesh" isn't really describing a sinful nature, but more accurately refers to every thought, emotion, desire, and part of you that isn't under the control of your brand-new, righteous spirit.
  - A. Technically speaking, what's true of the Holy Spirit is also true of your born-again spirit because they are one.
    - "But he that is joined unto the Lord is one spirit" (1 Cor. 6:17).
  - B. Since there aren't capital letters in the Greek, translators decided from the context of a passage whether to render it "Spirit" or "spirit."
  - C. Either way—Holy Spirit or born-again spirit—the same point is made.
    - "Walk in the Spirit [spirit], and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh" (Gal. 5:16, brackets mine).
- 7. The thoughts, desires, patterns, and habits that were established in you through the old sinful nature will begin to diminish as you choose to be dominated by your spirit instead.
  - A. You can break all of those things off because, in your spirit, you're already free.
  - B. It's just a matter of renewing your mind and beginning to manifest who you are in Christ.

### The Impossible Life

Lesson 20 – Outline

1. Paul acknowledged his born-again spirit, but declared, "There is no good thing in my flesh—my unrenewed mind and physical body, all the external parts of me functioning independent from Christ."

"For that which I do I allow not: for what I would, that do I not; but what I hate, that do I. If then I do that which I would not, I consent unto the law that it is good. Now then it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me. For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh,) dwelleth no good thing: for to will is present with me; but how to perform that which is good I find not. For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do. Now if I do that I would not, it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me. I find then a law, that, when I would do good, evil is present with me. For I delight in the law of God after theinward man: But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members" (Rom. 7:15-23, emphasis mine).

A. Sounds a lot like what he wrote in Galatians:

"For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would" (Gal. 5:17).

- B. Then Paul summarized his dismal dilemma in Romans 7:24:
  - "O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?"
- 2. Paul was simply describing the inability of the flesh—your physical ability, natural mind, emotions, and all actions independent from Christ—to please God.
  - A. In your flesh, you can't do what the Lord has told you to do.
  - B. It's natural to be self-serving, self-seeking, and self-promoting.
  - C. Without supernatural assistance, it's impossible to do what Jesus commands.
- 3. There's a tremendous amount of liberty that comes with recognizing and releasing Christ in you.
  - A. The Lord wants you to forgive totally—as much and as many times as it takes.
  - B. When you humble yourself, turning away from your own natural ability and to God and His divine ability, you'll discover a supernatural strength flowing through you.

4. You have an unlimited supply of God's kind of love in your spirit.

"Charity suffereth long, and is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil; Rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth; Beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things" (1 Cor. 13:4-7).

- A. His love never fails (1 Cor. 13:8).
- B. In your spirit, you have an unlimited ability to forgive, endure, believe, and hope.
- C. Now, let your spirit take over.

"Then came Peter to him, and said, Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times? Jesus saith unto him, I say not unto thee, Until seven times: but, Until seventy times seven" (Matt. 18:21-22).

"Charity suffereth long, and is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil; Rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth; Beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things. Charity never faileth: but whether there be prophecies, they shall fail; whether there be tongues, they shall cease; whether there be knowledge, it shall vanish away" (1 Cor. 13:4-8).

  - B. Once you believe, you must reject the flesh and walk by who you are in the spirit.
  - C. As you cultivate a good image of who you are in Christ and it becomes real to you, you'll release and experience your true identity.

- 5. The Christian life is growing stronger in the Spirit and weaker in the flesh.
  - A. The flesh's dominance steadily diminishes as you learn to consistently depend on and draw out more of what's in your spirit.
  - B. Focus on who you are in the spirit by meditating on God's Word, and your flesh will bow the knee to the spirit's rule and reign.
    - "Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would" (Gal. 5:16-17).
  - C. You'll break the control of the flesh as you base your identity and potential on what the Word says about who you are in Christ.
  - D. Instead of being controlled by your old carnal self, your spirit man will begin to dominate.

"There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit" (Rom. 8:1).

"This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would" (Gal. 5:16-17).

"The wicked flee when no man pursueth: but the righteous are bold as a lion" (Prov. 28:1).

"And the spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the LORD" (Is. 11:2).

Lesson 22 – Outline

- 1. Through spiritual dyslexia, most people perceive Galatians 5:16 completely backwards!
  - "This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh" (Gal. 5:16).
  - A. This verse doesn't say "Walk in the Spirit, and you'll hinder the flesh" or "Overcome the flesh, and then you'll walk in the Spirit."
  - B. It says just the opposite: "Walk in the Spirit, and you won't fulfill the lust of the flesh."
  - C. When you walk in the Spirit (turn on the light), by default—as a byproduct—you won't fulfill the lust of the flesh (darkness flees).
- 2. You can know whether you're walking in the Spirit or not by what your attention is on.
  - "For they that are after the flesh do mind the things of the flesh; but they that are after the Spirit the things of the Spirit" (Rom. 8:5).
  - A. What you're thinking about will tell you whether you're in the flesh or the spirit.
  - B. If your mind is stayed on the things of the flesh, then you're in the flesh.
- 3. By learning to keep your mind stayed on God, your spirit will dominate and control your flesh.
  - "For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace" (Rom. 8:6).
  - A. This isn't just quality time; it's both quality *and* quantity of time spent focused on the things of God.
  - B "Carnal" means of the five senses
  - C. Carnal-mindedness is being fleshly, physical, outward-minded instead of spiritually minded.
  - D. To be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace.
  - E. You need to get to where God's Word dominates you more than what you can see, taste, hear, smell, and feel.
- 4. Seeing a truth doesn't mean you'll automatically profit from it.
  - A. Normally, conflict will arise.

- "After you were illuminated, ye endured a great fight of afflictions" (Heb. 10:32).

Lesson 22 – Additional Information

For an in-depth look at healing, I recommend my teaching entitled God Wants You Well.

Recently I was required to take a treadmill test while receiving a qualifying physical for an insurance policy. However, since I refused to allow them to shave my chest hair, the electrodes fell off after only twelve minutes. Several weeks later, the insurance company called and said they couldn't insure me. They cited the fact that my readings indicated I had a serious heart problem that surfaced at about the twelfth minute of the test. When I asked them if the electrodes falling off would've made a difference or not, they decided to give me another test.

This time I let them shave my chest, but not before informing the nurse that she was removing virgin hair! I finished the test without incident and waited for the doctor to review my results. He was fine with my readings up until about the thirteenth minute of the test. That's when he got a worried look on his face and told me I had a serious problem. This medical professional then advised me of my "need" to see a specialist that very day and began writing out the note for me to give to this other doctor.

I boldly looked this man in the face and declared, "I don't believe your results!" It was easy to see that he wasn't used to someone countering his opinion. However, I challenged him to look again at the printout and then honestly tell me that I had a heart problem.

He replied, "Well, this doesn't really say you have a heart problem. It's just that your results aren't completely typical. Since everyone's heart is a little different, you could be totally healthy. I just think you should go get another test!"

"That's not what you said!" I thundered. "You told me I had a serious heart problem, not that there's a small chance and you think I should get another opinion."

This guy backed down and sputtered, "You're fine. Just forget about that other test."

Most people would have taken the word of this doctor over the Word of God, which emphatically declares that we're healed. By the time they finished obsessing about it, their hearts would have failed—from fear (Luke 21:26)! The next time you're faced with a report that's contrary to God's, whose report will you choose to believe?

Lesson 22 – Scriptures

"This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh" (Gal. 5:16).

"For they that are after the flesh do mind the things of the flesh; but they that are after the Spirit the things of the Spirit. For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace" (Rom. 8:5-6).

"But call to remembrance the former days, in which, after ye were illuminated, ye endured a great fight of afflictions" (Heb. 10:32).

"And these are they by the way side, where the word is sown; but when they have heard, Satan cometh immediately, and taketh away the word that was sown in their hearts.... And the cares of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches, and the lusts of other things entering in, choke the word, and it becometh unfruitful" (Mark 4:15 and 19).

"Who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed" (1 Pet. 2:24).

"The eyes of your understanding being enlightened; that ye may know what is the hope of his calling, and what the riches of the glory of his inheritance in the saints, And what is the exceeding greatness of his power to us-ward who believe, according to the working of his mighty power, Which he wrought in Christ, when he raised him from the dead, and set him at his own right hand in the heavenly places" (Eph. 1:18-20).

"Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone... But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead?... For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also" (James 2:17, 20, and 26).

"It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life" (John 6:63).

"So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God" (Rom. 8:8).

"Men's hearts failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth: for the powers of heaven shall be shaken" (Luke 21:26).

Lesson 23 – Outline

- 1. When you make Jesus Christ Lord of your life by truly believing on Him, an instantaneous change takes place.
  - A. This change occurs in your spirit, not your flesh (i.e., your body and soul).
  - B. Whether the change ever manifests itself in your physical realm depends on what you think.
- 2. The flesh, your natural self, pulls in one direction, and your spirit leads you in another.
  - A. How you think determines what you experience.
  - B. If your mind stays only on physical things—not even necessarily sinful things—then you'll be limited to and dominated by your flesh.
- 3. The only way you'll experience the power of God within you is to walk in the Spirit.
  - A. You have to get beyond the physical and acknowledge that there is a spiritual world.
  - B. As you recognize your true power and believe, the spiritual realm will become more real to you than the physical.
  - C. Everything in the natural may be coming against the Word, but if you stay in the spirit, fixed on what God's Word says, your spirit will overcome your flesh and break its dominion.
  - D. That's when you'll see the Word manifest.
- 4. Whether you ever see your true spiritual potential released into your physical life or not depends on what you think (Rom. 12:2).
  - A. If natural things—either sinful or just plain carnal—dominate and control your thoughts, you'll shut off the flow of God's Spirit through you.
  - B. But if you dominate yourself with the truths of God's Word and get beyond the natural limitations of your five senses, you can start releasing the supernatural life that's inside you.
- 5. As long as you stay focused on the Word, you'll be able to experience a peace that passes understanding.
  - "And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:7).
  - "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me" (John 14:1).

- 6. If you want to experience God's best, you must understand these truths concerning spirit, soul, and body.
  - A. Spend less time feeding the flesh, and focus on the spirit instead.
  - B. You'll develop an entire mentality based on your new identity in Christ as you dominate yourself with what you see in the spiritual mirror of God's Word.
  - C. Soak your mind in these truths that God has spoken.
- 7. Renewing your mind to God's Word is a lifelong process.
  - A. Until you see Jesus face to face, you never arrive; you just leave.
  - B. Applying these truths will take some real focus and effort on your part.
  - C. The Holy Spirit will reveal to you who you are in Christ.
  - D. Pray out loud from your heart:

"Father, I open my heart to the Holy Spirit to continue revealing these truths to me. I recognize that this is a process and not just a one-time thing. Therefore, I ask You to give me greater revelation of spirit, soul, and body throughout the rest of my life. As I apply what You've shown me, please encourage me with some quick results. I want to establish new patterns of walking by the spirit so I can live a full and effective life in You.

"Thank You for bringing these truths to my remembrance when I need them. Thank You for helping me to share them with others so they, too, can break free from their flesh's dominion. Thank You for setting me free and using me to set many others free! I love You, Father! Amen."
